As we bring this Retreat to a close, let me first say a big thank you to the Chief Justice [His Honor Johnnie N. Lewis], who has been exceptional in staying with us for these two days, and participating in this Retreat.

We also want to thank the Legislature. Yesterday we had one member; today we have Representative Kettehkumehn Murray, who has come to represent the Speaker and the Legislative Branch, generally. They've been with us, and we want to thank him for staying throughout the session.

To our partners – they were with us yesterday, and many are still here – we say thanks for being a part of this, for interacting with us, for working in the break-out groups and bringing their experiences to bear, and helping us as we try together to formulate the way forward in achieving our overall national development objectives.

This is a very, very talented group of people; their ideas are bubbling, which reinvigorates and re-energizes me. So, when people ask, where do you get your strength? I get it from them, because when they do these things, they just enlighten me and get me moving and all our emotions working. So, I want to say a big thank you to those who have led the Pillars; they've worked on this, and today I think we see the results of all of this work.

A final word to the Minister of Planning and Economic Affairs and his colleagues: they have been the ICT gurus that produced all these charts. We know what they've done.

And to Minister Amara Konneh, I want him to know that we appreciate him. I continue to have the greatest confidence in his commitment, in his capacity and in his integrity. I want that message to be sent out to everybody.

I thank everybody for being a part of this meeting, for contributing so much to it. Let's now go forth, re-energized to take the next step as we take it upon ourselves to make sure that we achieve those objectives, so that when we come back here less than one year from now, we will be able to say: From Buchanan, we walked that long road, but we have reached where we wanted to reach.
